"I have officiated many playoffs, tournaments, and finals. However, being asked to officiate the high school finals at Prudential would be a favorite memory."


What's the best part about any given day of officiating?

What's the biggest misconception about the job of being an official?

"That it's easy to do and we are just there for the money. If parents, fans, and any other non-players understood what we go thru on any given weekend, instead of yelling, complaining, and so forth, they would be shocked at the commitment we make to their child."

What would you say to anyone thinking about becoming an official?

"Go for it. It creates a world of opportunity in so many ways and you find people who can help you in other parts of your life."
