1 MS. MAGUIRE: It is twelve o'five P.M.  
2 Call to order. We have 329 schools that have  
3 registered in attendance. We have a quorum.  
4 So, first I'd like to take a minute to introduce  
5 up on the dais here we have our General Counsel,  
6 Steve Goodell, who will be acting as a  
7 Parliamentarian, and we have our Advisory  
8 Committee Chair, Dave Frazier, who's an Athletic  
9 Director at Rutherford High School. Thank you  
10 for being here today.

11 MR. FRAZIER: Thank you.

12 MS. MAGUIRE: So I have a motion from Tom  
13 Mullahey from Clifton High School and a second  
14 from Jason Corley from Long Branch High School  
15 to omit a roll call. Is anyone opposed or  
16 anyone abstain from the roll call?

17 (No response.)

18 MS. MAGUIRE: Great. Seeing none, the  
19 record will note that attendance is based on the  
20 delegate cards that were submitted at  
21 registration.

22 For your information, the 2025 Annual  
23 Meeting transcript is available on the NJSIAA  
24 website under NJSIAA Inside NJSIAA under the  
25 Constitution and Legislation section. We will

1 notify all schools via an alert email when  
2 today's transcript is posted to the same  
3 location on our website.

4 Also please be reminded we will post a  
5 final loading summary by school via an alert  
6 email by the end of this week.

7 NJSIAA Assistant Directors, Al Stumpf,  
8 Sandy Mamary and Derryk Sellers will be around  
9 to collect your ballots. Paul Popadiuk, Chief  
10 Operating Officer, and Tony Maselli, Chief  
11 Operating Officer, will be counting all the  
12 ballots in a separate room.

13 Lastly please take your time. Ensure that  
14 each ballot is complete in its entirety  
15 including your school name, your signature and  
16 your votes. All -- and that all information is  
17 clearly legible. Every year we don't count  
18 votes because one of those three things has not  
19 been completed. So please take a moment to  
20 check.

21 Now, I will turn the meeting over to our  
22 Parliamentarian, Steve Goodell. Thank you.

23 MR. GOODELL: Thank you.

24 Good afternoon, everybody. We expect some  
25 interesting and (inaudible) things today with

1 four proposals. I'm here to lay down the rules  
2 for how that debate is going to go.

3 First thing you need to know is that any  
4 one of those four proposals could be adopted by  
5 a majority vote of the ballots cast. Majority  
6 vote of the ballots cast. The debate itself  
7 will take place in three separate sections. The  
8 proponent of the legislation, the person who is  
9 introducing it will be up here at the podium and  
10 introduce the legislation. Mr. Frazier will  
11 then call for a motion and a second. Then we  
12 will move to the first part of discussion.

13 The first part is for anybody who has a  
14 question about the proposal. This is to clear  
15 up any inconsistencies, misunderstandings you  
16 might have. If you have any questions, go to  
17 one of the mikes, introduce yourself, give your  
18 name, the position and your school and state  
19 your question, and the proponent can then answer  
20 it.

21 Once all questions have been resolved,  
22 turn the mike over to anybody who opposes the  
23 legislation. Anybody who opposes the  
24 legislation will be given three minutes. Once  
25 again, please go to one of the mikes, give your

1 name, your position and your school, and you  
2 will have three minutes to discuss why you  
3 oppose the legislation. We discourage  
4 repetitious remarks.

5 Once everybody has had a chance to oppose  
6 it has spoken, we turn the mikes over to anybody  
7 who wishes to endorse the legislation or speak  
8 in favor of it. Same rules, state your name,  
9 your school, your position and you got three  
10 minutes.

11 Once everybody has had a chance to say  
12 their piece, Mr. Frazier will call the question.  
13 Then it's time to vote. Everybody will be asked  
14 to mark the ballot. As Colleen said, please  
15 mark it legibly. No vote will be counted or is  
16 valid unless it appears on the regular voting  
17 ballot properly signed and executed by the  
18 person delegated as the voting representative of  
19 the school. Be sure to check the number of the  
20 ballot you're voting on before passing it down  
21 the aisle. Again, there's four ballots. Make  
22 sure you mark the right ballot.

23 Votes cast on ballots after the initial  
24 collection shall be marked void and not counted.  
25 So make sure you get it in on time.

1           You will be kept informed of the results  
2 of the voting. If the balloting is close, an  
3 announcement will not be made until all of the  
4 ballots are carefully counted and then  
5 recounted. Those are the rules.

6           I turn it over to Mr. Frazier.

7           MR. FRAZIER: Thank you, Steve.

8           Good afternoon, everyone. It's great to  
9 see you. My name is David Frazier. I am the  
10 Athletic Director of Rutherford High School  
11 serving as the Advisory Committee Chairperson.

12           The NJSIAA Advisory Committee met on  
13 December 10th, 2025 to review the four proposals  
14 that are set before you today. The NJSIAA  
15 Executive Committee voted to accept the  
16 proposals at their meeting in January -- on  
17 January 21st of 2026.

18           Following acceptance by the Executive  
19 Committee, member schools had the opportunity to  
20 provide feedback, input and ask questions about  
21 the proposals. In March of 2026, NJSIAA staff  
22 posted two special meetings to present the four  
23 proposals and invited participants to reach out  
24 to the legislation sponsors with questions and  
25 feedback. As Mr. Goodell stated, all four

1 proposals today require a majority of the  
2 ballots cast at this meeting.

3 Before we get into the proposals, I'm  
4 sending out a reminder please do not fold your  
5 proposals, so that makes counting difficult.  
6 You may turn them over, but please do not fold  
7 them. Okay.

8 Now, to hop into the business part of our  
9 meeting. The first proposal is on Ballot Number  
10 1. That is the proposal to amend the sports  
11 specific regulation and to add the sport of  
12 girls flag football. That is the gray ballot.

13 The sponsors of that legislation or that  
14 proposal is the NJSIAA staff. The NJSIAA staff  
15 has proposed to amend the NJSIAA rules and  
16 regulations, specific sports regs and add the  
17 sport of girls flag. The Advisory Committee and  
18 the Executive Committee have endorsed the  
19 proposal.

20 Before we move forward, I will ask for a  
21 motion to move the proposed legislation for  
22 adoption. Thank you. I see Tyshema of Winslow  
23 Township High School. I'll ask for a second.  
24 Joe Ricciardelli of New Milford High School.

25 At this time I will call Ms. Colleen

1 Maguire, Executive Director of the NJSIAA, up to  
2 the podium to present the proposal.

3 When she's finished, you may ask questions  
4 for clarification only. Clarification only.  
5 Miss Maguire.

6 MS. MAGUIRE: Thank you. Thank you again,  
7 Dave.

8 So, NJSIAA staff together with the  
9 Football Leagues and Conferences proposed to add  
10 girls flag football to the list of NJSIAA  
11 officially sanctioned sports starting with the  
12 2026-2027 school year. Girls flag football has  
13 been a provisional sport since the 2022-'23  
14 school year. Since then the sport has grown.

15 During the prior season, over 140 member  
16 schools sponsor girls flag football with  
17 approximately (inaudible) participating.  
18 Nationally girls flag football is the fastest  
19 growing emerging sport as reported.

20 Therefore, this proposal would add a new  
21 sport, girls flag football to the specific sport  
22 regulations and provide the rules and  
23 requirements for that sport. Thank you.

24 MR. FRAZIER: Thank you.

25 For the purpose of clarification, is there

1 anyone that has any questions of Ms. Maguire?

2 (No response.)

3 MR. FRAZIER: Seeing that there are none,  
4 is there anyone -- if there's anyone that wishes  
5 to speak against the motion, there are two  
6 microphones. What you will do is come up, state  
7 your name, state your school and your position.  
8 At this time is there anyone that wishes to  
9 speak against the motion? If so, come to the  
10 microphone.

11 (No response.)

12 MR. FRAZIER: Seeing that there's none, is  
13 there anyone that wishes to speak in favor of or  
14 endorsing the motion?

15 (No response.)

16 MR. FRAZIER: Okay. Seeing that there's  
17 none, I will call the first question. This  
18 propo -- excuse me. I will call the first  
19 question to propose to amend the NJSIAA rule and  
20 regulations, sports specific reg football rules.  
21 Note that this proposal requires a majority vote  
22 of the membership based on the total number of  
23 ballots cast. At this time, please make sure  
24 your ballot is filled in clearly and correctly,  
25 all lines and information is filled out,

1 signature and the printed area for your name.  
2 Do not fold. If there's a table helper that  
3 wishes to grab them all, the NJSIAA staff  
4 members will be around.

5 Any ballots left on the table? Any  
6 ballots left for me? Any other gray ballots?  
7 Going once, going twice. If there are no  
8 further -- excuse me. If there are no  
9 additional ballots on the floor, the staff has  
10 all the votes, proposal number 1 at this time is  
11 closed.

12 At this point, we will move on while they  
13 are counting the ballots for one -- proposal  
14 one, we'll move onto the second proposal, Ballot  
15 Number 2. That is your green ballot. Reminder  
16 not to fold.

17 Ballot Number 2 proposal to amend the  
18 NJSIAA bylaws and allow tri-ops in girls  
19 wrestling. The sponsor of that is Woodbridge  
20 High School. Woodbridge High School on behalf  
21 of the Greater Middlesex Conference and the Big  
22 North Conference has proposed to allow tri-ops  
23 in the sport of girls wrestling so wrestlers at  
24 three different schools can compete as a team  
25 comprised of all weight classes. The Advisory

1 Committee and the Executive Committee have  
2 endorsed this proposal.

3 At this time I would like to ask for a  
4 motion to move the proposed legislation for  
5 adoption. Thank you, Cynthia Wilks, Bridgeton  
6 High School. And I'll ask for a second, Pat  
7 Clark, Midland Park High School. Thank you,  
8 Pat.

9 At this time I'd like to call Mr. Joe  
10 Ward, Woodbridge High School Athletic Director  
11 to read the proposal.

12 MR. WARD: Good afternoon. I'm Joe Ward,  
13 Athletic Director at Woodbridge High School.

14 On behalf of the Greater Middlesex  
15 Conference and the Big North Conference, we have  
16 proposed to amend Article III of the bylaws to  
17 allow tri-ops in the sport of girls wrestling.  
18 This proposal would allow wrestlers at three  
19 different schools to compete as a full team  
20 comprised of all weight classes and would help  
21 formulate teams and grow the sport of girls  
22 wrestling so schools can eventually have their  
23 own individual teams.

24 MR. FRAZIER: For purposes of  
25 clarification, does anyone have any questions in

1 order to clarify the proposal?

2 (No response.)

3 MR. FRAZIER: Seeing that there's none,  
4 does anyone wish to speak against the motion?  
5 If you're willing to speak against, make your  
6 way towards the microphones.

7 (No response.)

8 MR. FRAZIER: Okay. Seeing that there's  
9 none, does anyone wish to speak in favor of the  
10 motion?

11 (No response.)

12 MR. FRAZIER: Okay. Seeing that there's  
13 none, I will now call the question for this  
14 proposal to amend the Cooperative Sports Rules.  
15 Note that the proposal requires a majority vote  
16 of the membership based on the total number of  
17 ballots. Once against please do not fold.  
18 Please fill out all information on the ballot,  
19 sign it, your vote, school address, et cetera,  
20 all of the information that is requested.  
21 Please feel free to hand your ballot to those  
22 who are assisting the NJSIAA.

23 The final check, does anyone still have a  
24 Ballot 2? Any others green ballots remaining?  
25 Going once, green ballots remaining going twice.

1 Final call, green ballots. Okay. Thank you.  
2 Ballot Number 2 is now officially closed.

3 At this time we will move onto the third  
4 proposal. That is Ballot Number 3. Continue to  
5 remind you please do not fold. Ballot Number 3  
6 is the blue ballot, the proposal to amend the  
7 sports specific regulation to require a shot  
8 clock in the sport of boys and girls lacrosse.  
9 The sponsor of this proposed legislation is  
10 Delbarton High School and Mountain Lakes High  
11 School. Both Delbarton and Mountain Lakes  
12 School -- High Schools, both have proposed  
13 requiring a shot clock for all varsity boys and  
14 girls lacrosse games starting with the 2027-2028  
15 school year and pending NFHS approval. The  
16 Advisory Committee and Executive Committee have  
17 endorsed this proposal.

18 At this time I will ask for a motion to  
19 move the proposed legislation for adoption.  
20 Thank you, Ja'Mon Dunn, South Amboy High School.  
21 And a second. Thank you, Sean Bullock, Dover  
22 High School.

23 At this time I'd like to call Mr. Matt  
24 Kovachik, Lacrosse Coach from the Delbarton  
25 School to read the proposal.

1 MR. KOVACHIK: Thank you, Mr. Frazier.

2 Proposal to amend the specific sport  
3 regulations to require shot clock in the sports  
4 of boy and girls lacrosse. Delbarton School and  
5 Mountain Lakes High School have proposed  
6 requiring a shot clock for all varsity boys and  
7 girls lacrosse teams starting with the 2027-2028  
8 school year and pending NFHS approval.

9 The sponsors believe implementing a shot  
10 clock would, among other things, provide a more  
11 consistent game experience, provide officials  
12 with consistent rule application across the  
13 state, help alleviate sportsmanship issues,  
14 address player safety concerns and modernize  
15 lacrosse in New Jersey. Thank you.

16 MR. FRAZIER: For clarification purposes,  
17 does anyone have any questions regarding the  
18 proposal? Clarification only.

19 (No response.)

20 MR. FRAZIER: Okay. Seeing that there are  
21 none, does anyone wish to speak against the  
22 motion? Find a microphone, state your name,  
23 your school and your position.

24 MR. HILL: Rob Hill, Glenridge High  
25 School, Athletic Director.

1           My rationale against this -- I do agree, I  
2 think for parts of the game pretty cool. I  
3 think as a former lacrosse coach I get it.

4           As an Athletic Director, when it comes to  
5 our budget and finding personnel, I already  
6 struggled to find people to work the clock in  
7 general. I worked the clock for boys and girls  
8 lacrosse six times so far this season by myself,  
9 and that is as the Site Supervisor who's there,  
10 now I'm obligated to being on the clock. Not  
11 the most efficient use of our time.

12           So, due to different aspects that all of  
13 our programs face, we're cutting things right  
14 now. So, I think we're kind of tone deaf at  
15 this time. We're cutting different levels of  
16 programs. We're cutting coaches. I think right  
17 now isn't the time to do this.

18           Also we play in a county park. Trying to  
19 bring a portable setup for every game is not  
20 feasible. I don't have the personnel to do  
21 that. So, for the people who are -- don't have  
22 a program, just think about that when you're  
23 placing your vote as well. It could impact a  
24 lot of us in a negative way. Thank you.

25           MR. FRAZIER: Thank you. Does anyone else

1 wish to speak against the motion?

2 (No response.)

3 MR. FRAZIER: Okay. Seeing that there's  
4 none, does anyone wish to speak for the motion?  
5 If so, please make your way towards the  
6 microphone.

7 (No response.)

8 MR. FRAZIER: Okay. Seeing that there's  
9 none, I will now call the question on this  
10 proposal to amend the NJSIAA rules and regs,  
11 sports specific regulations, lacrosse rules.  
12 Note this proposal also requires a majority vote  
13 of the total number of ballots cast. Once again  
14 please do not fold your ballots. NJSIAA staff  
15 will be available to collect those. Ballots are  
16 still being collected. Derryk and Al are still  
17 collecting.

18 Are there any other blue ballots on the  
19 floor? First call for blue ballots, second  
20 call. Any other blue ballots on the floor?  
21 Yep, Al, we have a couple thataway. Sandy's  
22 grabbing them. Are there any blue ballots on  
23 the floor still needed to be picked up? Any  
24 other blues aside from the gentleman near Sandy?  
25 Any other blue ballots on the floor? Going

1 once, going twice. Final call on blue ballots.  
2 Okay. Ballot Number 3 is now closed.

3 Okay. Before we move onto the last  
4 ballot, we do have results of Ballot Number 1,  
5 proposal to amend the sports specific  
6 regulations and add the sport of girls flag  
7 football. Ballot Number 1 with three  
8 abstentions, 311 yes, 18 no, three abstentions.  
9 Once again that's 311 yeah, 18 nay, three  
10 abstain. Ballot Number 1, so the proposed  
11 legislation passes for the sport of girls flag  
12 football.

13 Ballot Number 2 which was the proposed  
14 amendment of the NJSIAA bylaws to allow tri-ops  
15 in girls wrestling with 323 yeah, five nay and  
16 four abstentions. Once again 323 yes, five no,  
17 four abstentions. The motion carries for Ballot  
18 Number 2 as well.

19 As we await Ballot Number 3, we will move  
20 forward with our final ballot of today the  
21 proposal to amend the sports specific regulation  
22 to require a shot clock in the sport of  
23 basketball. Sponsor, Montgomery High School and  
24 Christian Brothers Academy. Montgomery High  
25 School and Christian Brothers Academy together

1 and on behalf of the Executive Committee of the  
2 New Jersey Basketball Coaches Association  
3 proposed requiring a shot clock for all varsity  
4 boys and girls basketball games starting with  
5 the 2027-2028 school year. Both the Advisory  
6 Committee and the Executive Committee have  
7 endorsed the proposal.

8 At this time, I will ask for a motion to  
9 move the proposed legislation for adoption. Mr.  
10 Kevin Murphy from Washington Township High  
11 School, and a second, thank you, Dave Hutchinson  
12 from Randolph High School. Thank you both.

13 At this time, I'd like to call Mr. Kris  
14 Grundy, Athletic Director at Montgomery High  
15 School to read the proposal.

16 MR. GRUNDY: No love from the Skyland  
17 Conference.

18 Kris Grundy, Montgomery High School on  
19 behalf of Nick Mariniello from CBA and the New  
20 Jersey Basketball Coaches Association, I'm here  
21 to talk about the shot clock. So, Montgomery  
22 High School and CBA together on behalf of the  
23 Executive Committee of NJBCA proposed requiring  
24 a shot clock for all varsity boys and girls  
25 basketball games starting with the 2027-2028

1 school year. The NFHS Basketball Rules  
2 Committee approved use of 35 shot -- 35-second  
3 shot clock starting with the 2022-2023 season.  
4 Since then, 32 states have adopted it. The  
5 sponsors believe implementing the shot clock  
6 would, among other things, align New Jersey with  
7 national standards, promote better pace and flow  
8 of the game, improve the quality of play, build  
9 essential life skills, benefit officials and  
10 prepare players for the next level. The  
11 Advisory Committee and the Executive Committee  
12 have endorsed this proposal as well.

13 MR. FRAZIER: Thank you.

14 At this time is there anyone that has any  
15 questions for clarification on the proposal?  
16 Any clarification questions? Yes. We do have  
17 one. State your name, school, position.

18 MR. GEORGE: Tim George, Haddon Township,  
19 Athletic Director.

20 A quick question. How would the -- how  
21 would the shot clock work with the mercy rule?

22 MR. GRUNDY: That hasn't been fully  
23 discussed yet as it pertains to talking with the  
24 assignors and talking with various athletic  
25 directors and New Jersey Basketball Coaches

1 Association. We wanted to get the shot clock  
2 hopefully passed first and then that would be  
3 something that we could address with the  
4 assignors and with the NJSIAA.

5 MR. FRAZIER: Thank you.

6 Any other questions for clarification? So  
7 please stand up and wave your hand so I can see  
8 you. Clarification?

9 (No response.)

10 MR. FRAZIER: Okay. At this time does  
11 anyone -- try that one more time. At this time  
12 does anyone wish to speak against the motion?  
13 Once again please state your name, school and  
14 position.

15 MR. PEDE: Mike Pede, Athletic Director,  
16 Middlesex County Magnet Schools.

17 So, as we discussed out of Atlantic City,  
18 no analysis has been done about the cost. Every  
19 school has to purchase shot clocks on top of  
20 having someone operate the shot clock. We asked  
21 some questions in Atlantic City about the --  
22 which we just had now about the running clock  
23 and about if it's not functional. There's no  
24 information. We haven't discussed it. We  
25 haven't figured that out yet, and then just in

1 my opinion I think with the -- with the running  
2 clock it's just gonna -- games where I lose by  
3 40, now I'm losing by 70 or 80 because your  
4 varsity kids cause you were (inaudible). I  
5 implore everyone in this room right now to vote  
6 no. Thank you.

7 MR. FRAZIER: Anyone else wanting to speak  
8 against the motion? Please state your name,  
9 school and position.

10 MR. BROWN: Chris Brown, Park Ridge High  
11 School.

12 Again, I know how hard it is sometimes to  
13 get legislation passed. So, I -- you know, for  
14 the guys who put this up, you know, for the best  
15 of the game, I think, you know, your heart's in  
16 the right place. I know as Mike just said and  
17 even earlier with the shot clocks in lacrosse,  
18 the cost to purchase, the cost to operate. We  
19 already have a lack of officials. So now you  
20 have to get people to train to run these which  
21 is going to cause major problems, and they need  
22 to understand how it works because it's an  
23 important part of the game obviously.

24 When you talk about prep for the next  
25 level, most AAU teams don't use it, and that's

1 truly where you're prepping for advanced level.  
2 We're high school here. Three percent of the  
3 kids in high school -- three percent of the kids  
4 go to the next level to play. What about the  
5 other 97 percent? You know, we're responsible  
6 to educate them as well. I understand that you  
7 want to try and get them ready and, you know,  
8 we've got some great players in the state, but I  
9 don't know if that really is a great push for  
10 it.

11 Talk about flow of the game. You know,  
12 really try to watch especially knowing that the  
13 shot clock was coming this year or the  
14 possibility of it. I could count maybe on three  
15 or four times where they even got close to 35  
16 seconds. Most of these kids, they go up and  
17 shoot ten. I don't know if we really need it at  
18 this point.

19 Sportsmanship obviously as Mike said  
20 that's a huge part. We have so many issues  
21 already with the game, and now we don't have  
22 clarity on where it's going to go, and as he  
23 said it's going to force teams to score.  
24 They're going to have to shoot. You have to,  
25 you know, and really for all those reasons

1 that's why I would say please again vote  
2 against. I don't think it's great. It's the  
3 wrong place, wrong time, tone deaf with  
4 districts. Up by us certain districts are  
5 cutting teachers and we're going to add a shot  
6 clock. It's not just the right place. Thank  
7 you.

8 MR. FRAZIER: Thank you.

9 Anyone else that wishes to speak against  
10 the motion?

11 (No response.)

12 MR. FRAZIER: Seeing there is none, does  
13 anyone wish to speak in favor of the motion? In  
14 favor of the motion?

15 (No response.)

16 MR. FRAZIER: Seeing that there's none, I  
17 will call the question. Again, please do not  
18 fold the ballots. I'll call the question for  
19 this proposal to amend the NJSIAA rules and  
20 regulations, specific sports regs, basketball  
21 rules. Please note that this proposal requires  
22 a majority vote based on the total number of  
23 ballots cast.

24 Once again, ladies and gentleman, make  
25 sure it is filled out properly with your name,

1 school address, et cetera. Once again yellow  
2 ballots? Any others out there still? To my  
3 left, no. Any other yellow ballots? Center,  
4 any yellow? To my right? Calling once, calling  
5 twice. Any other yellow ballots? Okay. Final  
6 call. Ballot Number 4 is officially closed.

7 As we wait for the results to come in for  
8 Ballot 3 and 4, the meeting is still open. It  
9 is not closed or adjourned until the final votes  
10 have been tallied. So please feel free to sit  
11 amongst each other, coffee, whatever, dessert.  
12 We will get the tallies.

13 Ballot Number 3 -- excuse me, gents and  
14 ladies. Can I have your attention please?  
15 Thank you. Ballot Number 3, proposal to amend  
16 the sports specific regulations to require a  
17 shot clock in the sports of boys and girls  
18 lacrosse, 149 yeah, 166 nay, 21 abstentions.  
19 Three hundred thirty-six votes were cast,  
20 ballots cast. That's 149 yeahs, 166 nay, 21  
21 abstentions. The motion does not carry.

22 Ballot Number 4 is still being counted.  
23 When the count comes in, I'll resume my place at
